# BEAUMONT GRADE LEVEL NEWS and Monthly Report March 2011

# <u>Kindergarten</u>

March was a special time in Kindergarten. Bring on

Bears was our monthly theme and we enjoyed many factual and entertaining stories about bears throughout the month. We also watched as our hibernating bears on display outside our classroom "wake up" to welcome the spring!

March also brought new life to our classrooms. We began our chick-hatching project on March  $8^{th}$  and it ran through until March  $18^{th}$ . The children

were immersed in the excitement of watching the little chicks hatch and grow over the time they were with us. Our kindergarten students also had many opportunities to interact with the chicks and then record what they had learned in their very own "chick journals." This embryology project was certainly a wonderful hands-on experience and served as the kick-off for our study unit about life

wonderful hands-on experience and served as the Rick-off for our study unit about life cycles.

In April we will also be engaged in additional life cycle projects with other little critters such as; ladybugs, butterflies, and praying mantises.

As the days got milder and the spring season began, we also noticed changes in the weather. In science we began to learn about the wind and the different types of weather. We also took notice of how the world seems to "wake up" from its winter slumber bursting with all types of vibrant colors.

March was an exciting time for our Beaumont Kindergartners as they welcomed a new season, celebrated new life, and observed new weather patterns.

# First Grade

With the arrival of spring, things are really heating up in first grade as we begin our study of the rain forest. In addition to learning the names of the layers that make up the rain forest, the children are also learning about the plants and animals that make their home there. All of the first grade classes worked together to create a mural depicting a typical rain forest in our hallway. They will also learn about the products that come from the rain forest and the importance of protecting and preserving them in our world. Our study of the rain forest spreads throughout Beaumont to all of the special area classes that we visit all through the week. Be sure to ask your first grader to tell you about the many interesting facets of what we have been learning in science.

## Second Grade

March was another fun month in 2<sup>nd</sup> grade! In Social Studies, we began to learn about some famous explorers, such as The Vikings, Marco Polo, and Christopher Columbus.

Their bravery and adventure were very important to the discovery of the new world.

In science we are learning about Space and the Solar System. We will be exploring the inner and outer planets, as well as other topics related to space. It's sure to be an "out of this world"

experience!

Upcoming events include: Art Goes to School - Week of March 28<sup>th</sup>; Second Grade field trip in late April to Perelman Theater in Philadelphia - be on the lookout for more information to come home soon!

Let's hope, now that spring is here, warmer weather will soon follow!

## Third Grade

Biography projects are under way!!! Students have randomly chosen the famous Pennsylvanian that they are researching. Information should be put onto index cards in bullet form. Visual aides should be decided upon and worked on. Biography presentations will begin on Monday, May 9<sup>th</sup>. It is highly recommended that each child practices their oral biography report several times to insure familiarity with the content they will present. Have fun!! 

There will be more info to follow.



As a reminder, the third grade will go on a field trip to Philadelphia on Thursday, May 26<sup>th</sup>. We will <u>LEAVE school at 8:15, so your child will need to be in their classroom at 8:00. You will need to provide transportation to school for your child on this day!!!! We will visit many historical sites, including the US Mint, Franklin's grave, Liberty Bell,</u>

Independence Court, and the National Constitution Center. We will be doing a lot of walking, so sneakers are required. What a great field trip!!!

## Fourth Grade- March Madness





"Racers, start your engines!" Students are working in teams to create vehicles in order to conduct tests on force-acceleration and resistance. This science unit is always a favorite.

We continue to study the Revolutionary War. Students are learning about the Patriots, disagreements with England, and the formation of our democracy.

P.A.L. presentations will begin following the PSSA testing period-fourth graders will present a topic of personal interest. Check with your student for date and time.

The weather is warming up but mornings are still a little chilly -be sure to have your student bring a sweatshirt to school until the chill is out of the air.

# Special Areas

### Applied Technology

Students in Applied Technology have been busy learning a variety of computer skills. Kindergarten students have just finished creating patterns on a set of mittens and are starting a lesson on constellations. The first graders just finished learning how to add graphs to a sign and are now working on learning the map of Japan. Second graders just finished drawing a world map and labeling the continents and oceans. They will be starting a unit on graphing. The third grade students are researching Benjamin Franklin and will design a one page newsletter about one part on Benjamin Franklin's life. Lastly, our fourth graders have be learning power point and presented their reports using the SMART board.

#### Art

Kindergarten students learned about artist Miro' and his surrealistic approach to art. They learned that Miro' painted images that have a dream like and child like quality to them. Students have painted the backgrounds of their dreams with watercolor and will be adding textures by doing rubbings with found objects and will also be using cut paper and paint to enhance their projects.

First grade students created decorative Japanese fans. They drew a Japanese motif (dragon, tsunami, flowers, cherry blossoms) and colored their drawing in with crayons. After coloring students added crayon resist with water color, cut out their fans and another tracing of their fan and added craft sticks for a finishing touch. Some students also learned about Gyotaku (Gyo- fish- taku-rubbing). Students were given rubber fish to paint using 3 colors. Next, they made prints on tracing paper and let them dry. The following class students chose Japanese symbols and placed them around their fish, added a little red stamp to resemble a chop and enhanced their fish print by using white, black and a color.

Second grade students learned about the link between Chinese sculptures of horses and America's carousel horses. Using simple shapes students drew a carousel horse in their sketchbook and transferred it to metal where they learned about the relief process. Using wooden stylus' students made areas pop and go down. The last step was to rub black paint into the indented grooves. Since February is Black History Month students learned about the famous African American artist Faith Ringgold. They learned that she created paintings on quilts and used her paintings to tell a story. Students developed 4 different concepts: 1) A dream I have... 2) I wish I could... 3) I want to become... 4) A memory I have... After choosing their favorite drawing students made sure to add fore-ground, midground and background and transferred their drawing to good paper. Using markers they colored in their projects and added a paper, quilt-like frame. The last step was to give their painting a title and write it around their drawing.

Third grade is finishing a unit on Native Americans and will be making storytellers out of clay. The storyteller can be either an animal or a human. Once completed, students will be painting their projects.

Fourth graders learned about Pop-Artist Roy Lichtenstein. They learned about his use of *Benday dots*, decorative line, and bright solid colors. Students took Lichtenstein's style and added it to a cartoon of their choice. Students also applied the "math in art" concept as they measured and used a grid to make their cartoon twice the size of the original. Students are adding color with marker.

### Library

During the teaching cycle that surrounded Dr. Seuss's birthday (March 2<sup>nd</sup>) kindergarten, first, and second grade learned more about him. In kindergarten we read the first book that he wrote, And to Think That I Saw It on Mulberry Street and learned that it took a long time to get it published. First grade heard his If I Ran the Zoo and then made a crazy animal flip book. Second grade saw a movie about his life and then heard his story "The Sneetches." All grades voted for their favorite book among the PA Young Reader's Award choices. In the K-3 category the winner was *Chester* and the 3-6 grade winner was The Dunderheads. We will wait to see who wins in the state. Kindergarten also heard some stories about alphabetizing and then practiced with some activities on the SMART Board. First grade heard the last of their Japanese folk literature, sadly saying good-bye to the Kamishibai stories. Second grade was introduced to the way our library is set-up and practiced putting books on the library shelves in correct order using SMART Board lessons. Third grade has started working on their class ABC Book of Philadelphia by finding ideas for each letter. Morning recess sees many third graders in the library working on Super Sleuth. Fourth graders presented their animal research to their class and then began another Media Literacy lesson.

The 100 Book Club continues, with children adding leaves to the "library tree" and getting free paperback books when they have read 200 (or 400 or 600) books.

#### Music

March is Music in Our Schools Month. The purpose of Music in Our Schools Month is to raise awareness of the importance of music education for all children - and to remind citizens that school is where all children should have access to music. This is the time of year when music education becomes the focus of schools across the nation.

This month the students have been learning about the French composer, Camille Saint-Saens. While all of the classes have been able to experience the music of Saint-Saens, the first grade classes have learned about his masterpiece, "Carnival of the Animals". The students have studied the piece in depth, learning about all 13 animals in this musical carnival. Ask your child to describe to you the music of some of the animals he or she has learned about. In addition, this month the kindergarten classes have been learning about a piece of music written by Sergie Prokofiev called "Peter and the Wolf." This piece teaches the students about the instruments of the orchestra while telling a story about a boy named Peter and his adventures with a wolf.

Coming up in April, the 1<sup>st</sup>-4<sup>th</sup> grade students will have the opportunity to participate in "Share the Talent Day" in music class. Students who have a musical talent (playing an instrument, singing, dancing, etc.) will be given the opportunity to perform for their classmates during music class. More information will be sent home with your child soon, including a form that will need to be returned to Miss Hoover before your child can participate.

### Strings

Third grade string students are working hard to perfect their bow skills as our concert time draws closer. We are working very hard to combine all the skills we have learned so far to prepare for what will be some great music come concert time. Fourth grade string students are also hard at work preparing their concert music. They have also been perfecting the new skills they have learned over the past few months to incorporate into their concert music.

# Support Areas

In ESL we have been in full swing as we enter into spring! The students are busy bees continuing to learn about special events such as Chinese New Year! We are discussing all of the signs of spring as well such as the birds chirping and the green sprouts popping up everywhere! We are incorporating books into our Reading program that are full of new vocabulary! How wonderful it is to see our ESL students making progress as stories are being told and family traditions are shared. We look forward to the warm weather as it encourages oral proficiency skills across all levels.

# Health and Fitness News From the T/E Elementary Physical Education Department



### **Spring Sports Safety**

As winter turns into spring and temperatures increase, so does the amount of time that children spend outdoors playing spring sports. This means that the number of injuries to children can also increase.

Each year, more than 30 million children participate in sports in the United States and more than 3.5 million children ages 14 and under are treated for sports injuries. While collision and contact sports are associated with higher rates of injury, injuries from individual sports tend to be more severe.

In team sports, most injuries - 62 percent - occur during practices, not games. "The most common types of sport-related injuries in children are sprains (mostly ankle), muscle strains, bone or growth plate injuries, repetitive motion injuries, and heat-related illness."

"When we think of sports injuries, we tend to think of dramatic tackles or falls - such as the plays you often see on highlight reels, but young athletes are also at risk of injuries," says Rene Hopkins, Coordinator of Safe Kids East Central. "If your coach recommends certain types of warm-ups, it's not just to make you a better athlete - it will help keep you from getting hurt."

Consider these recommendations and precautions for all children playing or practicing any individual or team sport:

- Before signing up for a sport, get a general physical exam.
- Always wear appropriate protective gear for the activity - for practice as well as games - and make sure it's the right size and properly adjusted.
- Always do your warm-ups and cool-downs. If it's important before and after a game, it's important before and after practice too.
- Make sure responsible adults know and enforce the safety rules of the sport, are present to provide supervision, and are trained in first aid and CPR.
- Never "play through" an injury. Get immediate help from a coach or trainer and be sure to mention everything that hurts or aches. All coaches should have a plan for dealing with emergencies.
- If you're playing outside, wear SPF 15 or higher sunscreen.
- Follow the rules. In most sports, the rules are based not only on sportsmanship, but safety.
- Last but not least: "Stay hydrated," says Hopkins.
  "Drink plenty of water or electrolyte sports drinks before
  and during the activity, and rest frequently during hot
  weather. A child can lose up to a quart of sweat during
  two hours of exercise, and kids get overheated more
  quickly than adults and cannot cool down as easily."

### **SPRING ALLERGIES**

In the spring, depending on where you live, trees and grasses can be a common allergen, or trigger of your child's allergies.

Allergic rhinitis, or hay fever, is a common problem in infants and children. The most common symptoms include a stuffy or runny nose with clear drainage or congestion, repeated sneezing, itchy eyes and nose, sore throat, throat clearing and a cough that may be worse at night and in the morning. Children with allergies may also breathe through their mouth a lot and have dark circles under their eyes (allergic shiners).

These symptoms usually occur during certain times of the year for people with seasonal allergies, corresponding to being exposed to outdoor allergens, such as tree pollens, grasses and weeds.

Other people may have perennial allergies, with symptoms occurring year round from exposure to indoor allergens, such as dust mites and pets.

Although it can be helpful to avoid the things that you are allergic to, such as dust mites or cats, it is harder when you have seasonal allergies. Although it isn't practical to not go outside during your allergy season, there are some steps you can take to minimize your child's exposure to allergens (things that cause allergies), such as:

- keeping windows closed in the car and home to avoid exposure to pollens, especially on days when the pollen forecasts predict medium or high pollen levels
- limiting outdoor activities when pollen counts are highest (early morning for spring time tree pollens, afternoon and early evening for summer grasses, and in the middle of the day for ragweed in the fall.)
- taking a daily bath at bedtime, which may help to wash off allergens and prevent nighttime allergy problems
- take any preventative allergy medications, such as an antihistamine and/or nasal steroid spray before your child's allergy season begins and continuing them on a daily basis throughout your child's allergy season.

If your child's allergy symptoms aren't getting under control with your current medications, a recheck with your Pediatrician might be a good idea
