## BEAUMONT GRADE LEVEL NEWS Monthly Report January 2011

## Kindergarten

January was a special time in Kindergarten. We kicked off our night-time literature theme which carried over into many curriculum areas and we also celebrated the magic of the winter season with snowmen!

Our literature choices for the month focused on sleep-overs, dreams and other night-time adventures. The children could easily relate to the story characters as
 they experienced the nervousness and un-easy feelings of a first-time sleepover, talked about dreams and enjoyed the wonders that come from exploring the night.

Towards the middle of the month, we designed our very own "Dream Pillows." We all created a drawing of our very favorite dream and then with the help of our volunteer moms, we ironed the drawing onto a pillowcase to keep forever! As a special culminating event at the end of the month, we had a Jammie Party! Everyone came to school dressed in their jammies. We enjoyed hearing bedtime stories, making a dream puzzle and eating donuts with hot chocolate as a bed-time snack.

In science, we also learned about how day and night affect our world. In so doing, we learned about nocturnal and diurnal animals and their differences.

The frosty weather throughout the month also lent itself nicely to all of the activities we did with snowmen. We read lots of whimsical snowman stories and created unique and adorable snowmen to hang in the hall.

Even though January is still far from spring, kindergarten was able to keep warm and toasty with all our fun activities!


## First Grade

January was a fun filled month in first grade. We completed our weather unit in science. We had so much fun learning about all different kinds of weather. We conducted several fun experiments - making fog and rain in a beaker and tornadoes in a jar. We learned about rainbows and how they are made and got to experiment with prisms and color. Ask your child what ROY G. BIV means. We will start a fun, hands-on unit using magnets shortly in science.

In math we finished our geometry and fraction rotation. We learned the difference between flat and solid shapes, learned what a flat surface and vertices are and matched common objects to the solid shapes we learned about.

In our fractions unit, we learned how to tell if parts were equal or unequal. We drew lines of symmetry. We also learned about halves, thirds, and fourths and fractions of a set. We discovered that in fractions the smaller the denominator the bigger the portion and the bigger the denominator the smaller the portion. We learned this lesson in a yummy way. Ask your child what portion of cake they got to eat!

Second grade was very busy during the month of January! In Social Studies, the children continued to learn lots of fascinating information about China. They were involved in all sorts of hands-on lessons that you will have an opportunity to experience for yourself on China Day coming up in late February. We can't wait to show off our masks on Thursday, February $3^{\text {rd }}$ !

In science we just completed a unit on soils. Be sure to ask your child about the different layers of soil as well as the different types of soil. In addition, ask them if they know what a worm tastes like?!?!

A special thank you to the Walnut Street Theater who visited us this past month and taught us all some great strategies on how to recognize and react to a bullying situation.

As always, in this cold weather, we encourage our students to find a special spot and
 continue their reading.

## Third Grade

Happy New Year! We wish everyone and their families a happy, healthy and prosperous 2011!!!!

Third grade has begun our study of Pennsylvania. What an exciting unit!!!!! Some topics that we will be learning about: Pennsylvania's
 surrounding states, rivers, resources, climate, population, regions, and state symbols. We will take a Pennsylvania test sometime in February.

In science, we have begun our unit titled Land and Water. In this unit, third graders will discover how moving water changes the land of our earth. We will be seeing the water cycle at work and will learn about dams and their uses.

## Fourth Grade

Happy New Year! We hope everyone enjoyed a nice winter break and has stayed warm during these very cold days. The $4^{\text {th }}$ grade kicked the New Year off by discussing New Year's Resolutions and goals for 2011. In Social Studies we are studying the American Revolution. We will get to experience, "A Day in the Life of a Continental Soldier," on January $21^{\text {st }}$. This is a program brought to us by Valley Forge National Park. The students will learn about medicine, clothing, chores, soldier songs and rations, officer responsibilities, toys, and how to march. It will be a fun day for all of us. We continue to learn about electric circuits in Science. The students are looking forward to the culminating project where they will build and wire a house with their teammates.

Please remember to turn in your child's permission slip for Family Life as this will begin the week of February 7th. Also, looking ahead to February, we will be introducing PAL with our annual PAL Kick-Off assembly on Friday, February 18th from 1:45-2:30 in the Cafeteria. All parents are welcome to attend.

## Special Areas \& Support Areas

## Applied Technology

Kindergarten continues to learn general computer skills while incorporating what they are learning in their class room curriculum. First graders are learning how to add graphic objects to their project. They are learning to copy and paste, size their objects and order their objects to create a collage. They will start lessons incorporating the Japan curriculum next week. Second grade classes learned about map skills studying concepts of county, state, and country as well as continents and oceans. The students create a free-form map of the world including labels for all the continents and oceans. Third grade students are researching Pennsylvania symbols and produced a poster depicting numerous state symbols, using Word Art and pictures. The fourth graders are creating a PowerPoint. They are using the Internet to compile information on a chosen topic and then they are using PowerPoint to create a slide show on their chosen topic. They will present their PowerPoint to the class.

## Art

Kindergarten has been busy making pinch pots and learning about warm colors. They also used their cutting and gluing skills to create penguins. They will continue their exploration of color by learning about cool colors and Van Gogh's Starry Night next.

First graders learned about the Japanese Legend of the Maneki Neko and created "Good Luck" cats out of model magic. They have been painted and studies have continued in Japan where we have begun to create 3-D sculptures using Origami.

Second grade classes have been learning about Chinese Cherry Blossom paintings and were able to explore painting with a straw. They were also introduced to Chinese Landscape paintings and will be concentrating on the use of value.

Third grade has been learning about Native American Totem Poles. The students chose an animal that they could be, or that best describes characteristics about them and are turning it into a paper mache' sculpture using paper towel tubes.

Some fourth graders have been learning about Keith Haring and his use of simplistic form. Students created prints using foam and ink and will be creating group murals to hang in the auditorium.

## Library

Kindergartens will hear some of our new literature, including books nominated for the Pennsylvania Young Reader's Award. First and second graders will continue to hear folktales from Japan and China, respectively. Third graders will have a lesson on how to do Super Sleuth and one on the Dewey Decimal System before beginning work on their class ABC Book of Philadelphia. Animal research will continue into February ending with each fourth grader using note cards to present their animal to the class.

Our first drawing for the Beaumont 100 Book Club was right before Winter Break. The top prize was a $\$ 10$ gift card to Barnes and Nobel. We will have two more this year. The "Reading Tree" continues to have personalized leaves added to its limbs. If you need a new beginning sheet, just ask in library and we will gladly provide one.

## Music

The New Year in music class has brought about the study of Austrian composer, Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart. Mozart was a child prodigy, learning to play the piano at age three and composing his first piece of music at age five. Through moving, singing, and playing activities the students have been able to experience some of Mozart's piano, orchestral, and opera works. Students in
third and fourth grade had the opportunity to write some of their own music in the style of Mozart and all grades have learned about various theme and variations that Mozart wrote. Ask your child, what very familiar melody did Mozart write?

The band, orchestra, and chorus students continue to make beautiful music! This is the last chance for any new fourth grade students to join chorus. If your child is interested in joining chorus, please send Miss Hoover an e-mail as soon as possible indicating his or her interest (hoovert@tesd.net). In addition, please remember that in the event of a 2 -hour delay band, orchestra, and chorus rehearsals will not take place before school. Lessons during school will take place, just on a modified schedule.

## Physical Education

This month we are finishing up the Winter Olympics! During this unit, students will participate in modified activities that resemble the Winter Olympic Games. Some of these activities include bob sledding, curling, partner skis, and the luge! All of these activities take place in Beaumont's gym. This is always a very popular unit with our students. Following the Olympics we will begin our floor hockey unit. During this time we will introduce and work on dribbling, passing, shooting, spatial awareness, teamwork and game concepts. Upper division will learn how to play actual floor hockey games while primary division will participate in modified games and activities to help develop their hand eye coordination, spatial awareness, and basic hockey skills. Kindergarten also participated in the Winter Olympics this year and are now involved in activities to help develop fitness, body awareness, balance, and coordination.

## Reading Aloud

Research indicates that an important activity for preparing your children to succeed as a reader is reading aloud together. Fill your story times with a variety
 of books. Be consistent, be patient, and watch the magic work. Here are helpful tips:

- Keep reading to your children even when they can read. Read books that are too difficult or long for them to read alone.
- Try reading books with chapters and talk about what is happening in the story. Encourage your children to make predictions about what will happen next and connect characters or events to those in other books.
- Talk with your children about favorite authors and help them find additional books by those authors.
- Take turns reading a story with your children---they read a page and you read a page.
- Talk about the meaning of new words and ideas introduced in books. Help your children think of examples of new concepts.
- Talk with your children about the beginning, middle, and end of the story to organize thinking and discussion.
- Ask your children to tell why a character might have taken a specific action. Ask for information from the story to support their answer.
- Enjoy yourself and have fun! The most important thing you can do to help your children become successful readers is to communicate that reading is valuable and enjoyable.

# Health and Fitness News <br> From the T/E Elementary Physical Education Department 

A recent article in the New York Times advocates free play for children and illustrates current efforts to restore play to children's lives. Scientists, psychologists and educators believe that most of the social and intellectual skills that people need to succeed in school, work, and life are developed from play as a child. "Experts define play as a game or activity initiated and directed by children." (Stout, 2011) According to this definition, organized sports or video games do not count as play because organized sports are directed by an adult, while most video games are created by someone else. Additionally, many of the newer electronic or educational toys may not qualify as play either. For example, toys that count from 1 - 10 or sing the ABC's upon the push of a button are not created and directed by the child.

According to a 2007 report by the American Academy of Pediatrics, "play is essential to development because it contributes to the cognitive, physical, social and emotional wellbeing of youth." (Ginsburg, 2007) For example, playing a game of Simon Says teaches your child to follow directions, practice active listening skills and control their impulses. Building forts, towers with blocks, or a stage to perform on teach children to think creatively by using their imagination to create something new. Playing with other children provides the opportunity to problem solve and negotiate with others. Play can also provide time for parents to interact with their child. However, adults need to be careful that they are not instructing or directing children during play. Allow children the opportunity to explore and figure things out on their own. (Stout, 2011)

Some forms of play can also provide your child with the benefits of physical activity which include reducing risks for obesity and obesity related diseases, anxiety, stress, depression, aggression and improving sleep. Experts from the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia also cite three key areas of well being that can be improved through free play and physical activity. They include:

- Attention: This is an important skill needed for learning. Unstructured free time allows children the chance to make decisions, plan, organize and sequence.
- Affiliation: Children learn to connect with others, how to cooperate and how to compromise. Children also learn to be flexible, self-aware and self-regulating while cultivating empathy.
- Affect - Play makes children happy and improves their mood.


## So what can you do...?

Choose toys that require imagination
Encourage your kids to go outside and play
Limit the overuse of passive play such as television or computer games
Provide your child with blocks of unscheduled, independent, non-screen time.
Be wary of "overscheduling" - having too many extracurricular activities can cause stress and decrease potential positive interaction time with the family
Be a good role model - give yourself "play time" free of work
