Dear Beaumont Families,

Spring has finally arrived and the students and staff are so eager to enjoy the warm sunshine and sprouting flowers and leaves! We are preparing for another busy season at Beaumont. This is a great opportunity to share some short descriptions of a few upcoming school programs.

A new after school club for the spring session, **the Go Green Club**, has been planning several activities for Beaumont. Third and fourth grade students wrote and presented skits during all lunchtimes to promote "Litterless Lunches." The first Litterless Lunch was scheduled on Friday, April 15. Students were invited to pack lunches that included no trash and only recyclable containers. The Go Green Club also will facilitate playground trash clean-up sessions and will plant a small flower garden in the playground area. Through a partnership with Ursinus College, the club members will participate in a stream walk event to promote a study of ecology. The club members will display posters throughout the school with reminders to recycle, clean up trash, and other tips to be Earth-friendly.

For a glance into the classrooms, **Kindergarten's** theme for April is "Protect Our Planet" and includes a study of two units – trees and birds. The students have been bird-watching and making pinecone bird feeders as well as learning why trees are so important to the Earth.

First Grade is preparing for each classroom's World of Writing Shows where each student will share self-selected writing pieces from individual journals, writer's notebooks, friendly letters, poems, and writer's workshops. The students are eager to share their written work and some special songs will be included in the shows.

To support the social studies curriculum, **Second Grade** is planning a trip to Ellis Island and looking forward to their popular Immigration Day at the end of May. Immigration Day is one of the favorite activities in second grade that includes many parent volunteers and several inter-active stations and presentations.

Third Grade is very busy planning for their Oral Biography projects and their City Planning unit. In June, the third grade will be presenting the play "Living William Penn's Dream" which combines all of the social studies topics from the year.

In the month of May, **Fourth Grade** students will design a book about themselves – the All About Me project. This is a special culminating project for the fourth graders to share their writing, and it provides the opportunity for the students to reflect on their achievements through elementary school.

Moving to the **carpool line**, a quick reminder to be aware of the <u>new signs</u> posted along the carpool route. Please remember to keep the line moving and to drop off students at the <u>carpool doors</u> <u>only</u> where there is adult supervision. If you need to get out of your car, please either pull-up to the shed past the school doors or pull into a parking space.





Elementary Schools to Start Five Minutes Earlier in 2011-2012

Beginning in the 2011-2012 school year, T/E elementary schools will begin 5 minutes earlier to provide additional instructional time in the school day. School will start for elementary students at 8:45 am instead of 8:50 am and the new start time will be reflected on student bus schedules. School dismissal time will remain at 3:20 pm and morning kindergarten sessions will conclude at 11:40 am. Afternoon kindergarten sessions will begin at 12:25 pm, with the school day ending at 3:20 pm. Parents of students who walk or who are driven to school are asked to make note of the earlier start time for next year.

Change in Kindergarten 2-Hour Delay Schedule for 2011-2012

Beginning in the 2011-2012 school year, AM and PM kindergarten sessions will follow a modified schedule on days when inclement weather results in a 2-hour delayed opening. Each kindergarten session will be reduced by 1 hour when there is a delayed opening to provide equal instructional time for both sessions. AM kindergarten classes will begin at 10:45 am and will conclude at the modified pick-up time of 12:40 pm. Parents of PM kindergarten students should drop their children off at the modified start time of 1:25 pm. School dismissal time for PM kindergarten students remains at 3:20 pm. As a result, AM kindergarten students who use bus transportation to school will be picked up at their bus stops 2 hours later than usual and PM kindergarten students will ride the bus home at their regularly scheduled time. Parents are asked to make note of the change in the mid-day pick-up and drop-off times on days when there is a 2-hour delayed opening.

Summaries of School Board Committee Meetings for March 2011

Education Committee, Chair: Betsy Fadem

The March Education Committee meeting began with the Committee approving their 2011 goals. Key additions to this year's goals are curricular alignment to meet the Keystone exam implementation, review of the current middle school programming and the annual review of student assessments.

The Education Committee reviewed a cost reduction strategy to integrate the K-4 applied technology program into the core structure. The Committee discussed how the elementary special subject rotations would be implemented if applied technology, as a separate special, was eliminated. The Committee agreed to recommend this action to the Finance Committee and the full Board.

The Committee then approved a modified elementary team meeting structure. This modification would allow 1) daily team meetings, 2) a uniform daily start time for elementary staff, and 3) a flexible arrangement of team groupings to address student/parent needs. To accommodate this recommendation, the student daily start time would be 5 minutes earlier. This change will specifically need to be communicated to the walkers and those that are dropped off by parents. Bus schedules would be developed to make sure all students are at school for the 5 minute earlier start time.

Next, the Committee reviewed a modified 2-hour delay schedule for AM and PM kindergarten classes. In the event of a 2-hour delayed opening, both AM and PM kindergartens will have 1 hour subtracted from their schedule. This change will begin in 2011-2012 school year and information about the new kindergarten 2-hour delay schedule will be posted on the TESD web site.

The administration then presented the current data on special education definitions, number of students and costs.

The final topic of the meeting was a report from the administration on the District's online course program. Due to the outcome of a labor dispute, the program will not be continued in 2011-2012 school year. The District is appealing this decision.

Facilities Committee, Chair: Pete Motel

The Facilities Committee met on Friday March 18, 2011 at a new meeting time of 12:00 p.m. The Committee discussed enrollment projections for the 2011-2012 school year and the concern that Devon Elementary School has almost reached its enrollment limit. This discussion led to a dialogue with several public members in attendance about the possibility of redistricting some time in the future.

The Committee heard a report and saw drawings for the proposed outdoor classroom at New Eagle Elementary School. The project is being supported and funded by the New Eagle PTO. The Committee approved the plans and asked for an update when the project is finished.

The District's architect presented five different options for a new maintenance and storage facility. The options are to renovate the old transportation building, renovate the old transportation building and add new space, build a new facility on the current site, build a new facility on a different site or to rent a facility. The Committee noted that they are not ready to recommend any of these options to the full Board and will continue this discussion at future meetings.

Finally the Committee had a short discussion concerning a rate schedule for the use of Teamer Field and a new hourly rate schedule for District facility users. The Committee did not approve any changes to the rate schedules however the Committee asked the administration to inform users of District facilities that new hourly rates are possible in the near future.

Finance Committee, Chair: Kevin Mahoney

The Finance Committee met on March 14, 2011. The Committee heard several opinions from the public in attendance concerning the budget reduction strategy of outsourcing the District's custodial services. The District has sent out a request for proposal to potential custodial contractors however the Finance Committee has not reviewed the results. The outsourcing discussion will continue at a future meeting. The Board Treasurer presented the results of the February Treasurer's report that shows current revenues collected and the total amount of expenditures and encumbrances to date. Revenue and expenditure projections show that the District could end the fiscal year using less fund balance than budgeted.

At last month's meeting, the Committee heard a proposal from the law firm of Portnoff Law Associates, LTD to collect delinquent taxes. The Committee approved that proposal and asked that it be placed on the consent agenda at the March Board meeting.

Finally the Committee reviewed budget strategies to reduce expenditures or increase revenues in the 2011-2012 budget. The Committee asked that the Administration present a review of these strategies and the strategies that have already been discussed and approved by the Board, at the budget workshop scheduled for March.

Policy Committee, Chair: Kevin Buraks

The Policy Committee began the March 2nd meeting by continuing its review of **Policy 3185: Fund Balances Management.** The administration reviewed changes that the Government Accounting Standards Board has made to state and local governmental accounting and financial reporting guidelines. After extensive discussion about proposed new language to Policy 3185, the Committee decided to continue its review at its April 6th meeting.

The next item of business was a review of **Draft Policy 4105: Payroll and Other Disbursement to Employees.** The Committee edited the policy and recommended it and its accompanying regulation for a second reading at the March 21, 2011 meeting of the Board of School Directors.

The Policy Committee continued its discussion of whether a **new advertising policy should be** developed since the selling of advertising for extra curricular activities and events is listed as a strategy for the 2011-2012 budget. The Committee charged the administration with exploring the feasibility of working with a consultant who would facilitate advertising contracts on behalf of the District.

The Committee turned its attention to **Policy 3100: Budget Development Process.** The Committee made modifications to language for clarity. The District solicitor will make necessary revisions to Policy 3100 for Committee review at its next meeting on April 6th.

In the 2000 Policy Series, the Committee recommended Policy 2210: Building Principals, Policy 2211: Appointment of Building Principal, and Policy 2220: Assistant Principals: Middle School and High School for a second reading at the March School Board meeting. In addition, the repeal of Policy 2250: Committees **Organized by Principals** was recommended for a second reading, and the repeal of **Policy 2231: Director of Athletics** was recommended for a first reading.

The Policy Committee completed its review of **Policy 5116: Non Resident Students-Enrollment Eligibility** and recommended it for a second reading at the March School Board meeting. The Committee also completed its review of **Revised Policy 5119: Foreign Students and International Exchange Study Program** and recommended it for a second reading before the Board of School Directors.

The Committee then turned its attention to **Policy 9332: Exceptions to Board Policies and edited the policy** for greater clarity. The policy was recommended for a first reading at the March School Board meeting.

Finally, the Committee also held a discussion of **Policy 6146: Student Athletics** and decided that the policy will continue to be implemented as written.

Public Information Committee, Chair: Debbie Bookstaber

The Committee heard a presentation from the administration on how the District is using the TESD intranet to reduce paper and printing resources among staff members. The administration also presented a new section on the TESD web site called, "Events Open to the Community." This section is located under the "Community" menu of the web site and will include a calendar of school events open to the community as well as a link to a new Conestoga High School athletics calendar that will list upcoming athletic events. The new events calendars will be advertised once they have been finalized.

The administration is exploring the possibility of making TE Board Talk programs and other presentations available as podcasts from the TESD web site. RSS feeds on the web site would allow visitors to receive alerts when the podcasts have been posted. The podcasts would also be syndicated on iTunes. The administration will provide an update on this project to the Committee at a future meeting.

The Committee recommended that the next TE Board Talk program include Board member Pete Motel's review of the District's long range facilities plan from the February 28, 2011 regular School Board meeting.

The administration presented its plan to consolidate District postal permits to reduce the cost of permit fees. The Committee requested that the administration continue its campaign to encourage parents to use electronic communication and to reduce the number of paper copies of newsletters and other paper communications printed at the schools.

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Health and Fitness News From the T/E Elementary Physical Education Department



Don't Get Burned

Spring is here and summer is fast approaching, and many families will be spending more time outside. While the sun provides us with warm and inviting weather, it also sends down ultraviolet (UV) rays which can be harmful in excess. When your skin has been exposed to too many of these UV rays, you can get sunburn. Some people get sunburn faster than others, because they have less melanin. "Melanin is a chemical in the skin that protects it from sun damage by reflecting and absorbing UV rays. People with darker skin have more melanin, but even if you have dark hair, dark eyes, or darker-toned skin, you can still get sunburn. It will just take a little longer." Sunburns can be very painful and even cause blisters. In the long term, sunburns and excessive sun exposure can lead to wrinkles and even skin cancer as an adult. However, there are some things you can do in order to enjoy the beautiful outdoors while also protecting yourself.

- Always wear sunscreen with an SPF (sun protection factor) of 30 or higher. Try to apply 15-20 minutes before you go outside.
- While the SPF number tells you how long you can be in the sun without getting burned, it is always best to reapply sunscreen every 2 hours. This is especially important if you have been swimming or sweating – even if the sunscreen is waterproof and sweat-proof.
- 3. Apply sunscreen to all parts of your body that are exposed to sun. Don't forget to get your face, ears, neck, tops of feet, and even the part in your hair.
- Try to take frequent indoor or shade breaks. This will keep you cooler and out of the direct sunlight.
- 5. Wear a hat to protect and shade your face.
- 6. Your eyes are in need of protection too from UV rays. Wear sunglasses to protect your eyes – make sure they are labeled to block UV rays.

The sun's rays are the most powerful between the hours of 10:00 AM and 4:00 PM. By following the above precautions, you can still go outside to enjoy the weather during these times while also staying safe.

Field Day

The end of the school year means that it is time for Field Day! Students will participate in a variety of relays and games that require teamwork and good sportsmanship. For many students, this is one of the highlights of their year. You will receive further information from your Physical Education teacher as the date gets closer. The Physical Education teachers have offered some guideline for the day:

- Bring water bottles
- Wear sneakers
- Apply plenty of sunscreen
- Bathing suits can be worn under clothing
- Consider having a change of clothes available
- Label all clothing

ReciPE of the month

Fruit Popsicles

1 cup orange juice
1 cup white grape juice
Stir together and pour into molds to freeze.

Try combining different juices for a new flavor

Watermelon Popsicles

2 cups of watermelon cubed (remove seeds) 1 cup of apple juice Blend in blender until smooth. Pour into popsicle molds and freeze.


